PLAY AT THE PARKER PLAYHOUSE

JENNIFER MCHUGH IS DIRECTING a play written by the Ephron sisters who share moments from real life through a series of vignettes in “Love, Loss, and What I Wore”. The show, produced by Ellen Werksman, will be performed at Parker Playhouse the last weekend in February: Thursday, 2-21 at 7:30 p.m. (Pre-View Performance) Friday, 2-22 at 7:30 p.m. (Opening Night) Saturday, 2/-3 at 5 p.m. and 8 p.m.

“The play is a series of factual stories told as monologues of various women's memories of intense moments in their lives—and what they were wearing at the time! It's humorous, clever, poignant and true! I have cast

seven women who live in Barrington—of various ages, neighborhoods, and backgrounds,” McHugh says. “I'm thrilled to be working with this strong all female cast and sharing matters of the heart and matters of the closet!”

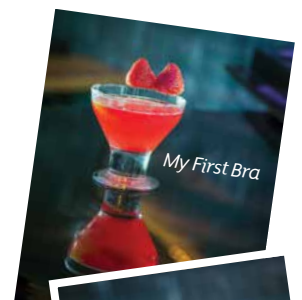
